## Nitrous Oxide

It's not a laughing matter



- Use of N<sub>2</sub>O (Balloons, Whippets, Hippie Crack) as a recreational drug is common. Around 9% of 16-24 year olds use it per year [1]
- Acutely it can cause LOC, asphyxia & seizures
- Avoid phenytoin in seizure management (Toxbase)
- If used directly from cannister can cause barotrauma & cold injury to throat/ lungs.
- Chronic use causes inactivation of B12 but B12 levels may be normal
- Can present with vague neurological symptoms, patchy numbness, usually worse in hands & feet, loss of dexterity, problems with balance/gait, leg weakness (with loss of reflexes)
- Can present with VTE or myelosuppression

## What to do

- Give hydroxocobalamin 1 mg IM and folic acid 5 mg oral to all patients with acute neurological features (See <u>Toxbase</u> for further advice)
- Prescribe B12
- Think harm reduction e.g. inhale from a balloon (<u>https://www.talktofrank.com/drug/nitrous-oxide</u>)
- Refer to GP/Drug services
- Consider safeguarding
